Welcome back! In this issue we follow up on a recent message included in Ms Westcott's newsletter about our expectations for children who bring a phone into school. We share advice on things to consider before buying a phone for your child and give guidance on how to setup the phone in order to keep them safe once they have it.

Mobiles at Meridian!

From September 2024, our policy will be changing to only allow children in Year 5 and Year 6 to bring in mobile phones <u>if</u> they are walking to and from school independently.

- All mobile phones must be switched off and put away in a bag or pocket as soon as entering school grounds (this includes waiting at the front of the school for the gates to open) at the start of the day.
- All mobile phones must be switched off and handed into the school office throughout the school day.
- All mobile phones must be switched off and put away in a bag or pocket whilst leaving the school grounds at the end of the day.

Does my child really need a phone?

We found some useful guidance to support our families when making the decision about when to give a device to their child.

- 1. Why do you want to get a phone? Whilst deciding if it is time for your child to have their first phone can be a great opportunity to find out what your child expects to use their phone for. This could be for connecting with friends, playing games, for keeping in touch whilst out of the house or other reasons.
- 2. What do you like about using one? You can ask your child about their favourite apps or games, what they like using their phone for, or you can ask them to show you how to play or use their favourite game or website.
- 3. What would you do if something worrying or upsetting happened whilst using your phone? You can ask them about the places they can go to find the safety advice, find out what they know about privacy settings, and ask them how to report or block on the services they use.
- 4. **Set some ground rules!** Discuss the responsibility that comes with having a device. Have open conversations about how and when they can use their phone. Work together to agree limits on **screen time** and any purchases allowed.

We have included guides for iPhone and android devices and showing you how to setup controls on age appropriate content and access to apps.




How to Set up

to limit age-inappropriate











The parental controls on iPhones allow you to block or restrict certain apps, features, content, downloads, or purchases. Setting limitations on content ratings, Siri and web searches enables you to filter out age-inappropriate content and vastly reduce the likelihood of your children being exposed to unsuitable material and information.







Set up Siri web

search restrictions

You can screen out explicit language to avoid Siri displaying inappropriate results. You could also disable Siri entirely, so your

child can't use it to search the web

Set up content rating restrictions

Content filters keep your child from viewing unsuitable material. They block apps, films and TV shows with specific age ratings, and music and podcasts with explicit content.

Set up web restrictions

Website content filters restrict age-inappropriate content on Safari. You can also blacklist certain websites or allow access only to approved sites.

- **Tap Web Content**
- Choose between Unrestricted Access, Limit Adult Websites and Allowed Websites Only





Android Phone



The settings on an Android device allow you to prescribe certain rules for when your child is using it. For example, you can block specific types of content to reduce the risk of your child being exposed to age-inappropriate material (music with explicit lyrics, for instance, and games, TV shows or movies that are unsuitable for young people). There are two ways to access parental controls on an Android phone: through Google Play or via the Google Family Link app. You can also lock your changes behind a PIN, so your child (or anyone else) can't change them back.







Choose how to filter or restrict

- Open the Play Store app
- Tap Menu (represented by three horizontal lines)
- 3 Tap Settings
- Tap Parental Controls
- Enable Parental Controls
- Create Pin
 - Tap the content you would like to restrict
- Choose how to filter or restrict access





Apple devices come with built-in apps already available: Mail, FaceTime and Safari, for example. However, you can choose which apps and features appear on your child's device and which ones don't. You can also manipulate the features in Game Centre to enhance your child's safety and privacy when playing games, as well as blocking iTunes or App Store purchases if you wish.










On Android phones, restricting access to particular apps usually requires going onto Google Play. From there, it's fairly easy to features can prevent your child from downloading or buying anything unsuitable for their age. Updated versions of apps or games that your child has already installed may occasionally contain something inappropriate, so we've explained how to stop those, too.
